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THEME OVERVIEW

The Bible can be a barrier for a lot of people of faith. It's large, intimidating, and can be confusing! Many people are wary to read these texts, carry bruises from their upbringing, or simply don't have enough information for the stories to make any sense. This summer, we invite you to spend time reclaiming the "good" in The Good Book - learning and relearning how ancient stories relate to our stories here and now. You will receive a free copy of Anna Carter Florence's newest book, A is for Alabaster: 52 Reflections on the Stories of Scripture. Building from these contemporary invitations into scripture, congregations will invite people to reflect on, write, or tell their own stories that interact with our ancestors in faith found in the Bible

Leaders can choose from an Old Testament or New Testament track, or jump back and forth between the two and build your own summer series of any length to fit the needs of your unique context. Perfect for congregations in transition, without a leader, or managing vacation schedules, this worship planning virtual "box" will provide all the tools needed to lead every piece of the worship experience from sermon suggestions, interactive worship ideas, graphics, social media, liturgy, and music suggestions. 
N is for Nicodemus

Week 1 Old Testament Track

S is for Salt

This resource includes a Call to Worship, Confession and Forgiveness or Thanksgiving for Baptism, Prayer of the Day for each week, Offering Prayer, Invitation to the Table, Prayer after Communion, Blessing, and Sending.

Call to Worship

Prayer of the Day

Grant us a new curiosity, a measure of gray in our black-and-white thinking, a crack in everything we thought to be true. Amen.

Invitation to the Table

This table is set for you – you who wrestle with God and you who would rather not, you who stand tall in the face of fear and you who turn away, you who are misunderstood and you who are understood all too well. Come. Share in God's meal of new beginnings.

Confession and Forgiveness

Gathered into one by God's Spirit, we are bold to confess our sins, our shortcomings, our failures, right here in the open, in the presence of God and of one another.

(silence for reflection)

God of grace,

We confess that we have failed you, failed ourselves, failed one another. We assume the worst about those around us, rather than giving anyone the benefit of the doubt. We do the same to ourselves, and sometimes, even, we do the same to you. We are stubborn and determined to hold a grudge. We fail to exercise our imaginations, fail to recognize your works waiting to be born, if only we would step up to help, or sometimes, if only we would move out of the way.

Forgive us, O God, and show us another way forward. Amen.

Hear the good news of the risen Christ: God is making all things new! Your sins are forgiven. God's invitation is to another way of living.

CHILDREN, YOUTH, AND FAMILY IDEAS

Week 1: S is for Salt

Theme: Empathy and Compassion Scripture: Genesis 19:15-17, 24-26

Genesis 19 recounts the dramatic and traumatic story of Lot and his family fleeing the city of Sodom before its destruction. It's a story of escape, faith, and the heartache of looking back.

Imagine the scene as Lot and his family hurry away from the city, warned by angels of its impending destruction. They are told not to look back, but Lot's wife cannot resist the temptation. In that moment of hesitation, she turns into a pillar of salt.

Story opportunities:

- A moment when you didn't have the whole picture and were asked to trust nonetheless. Lot and his family are warned and told to flee from the incoming danger. With a little back and forth, this seems to be an easy direction to follow. They're also told not to turn back, this direction? Not as much. This story can spark discussions about trust in God's guidance, and the guidance of trusted individuals around you.
- A time when letting go was really hard and how it turned out in the end. Truthfully we're more likely to be like Lot's wife. Suddenly we're asked to run from our home, our family and to never look back? That would be difficult for just about anvone. Sometime's life is like that. where we have to let go and not look back. There is a lot of grief and worry in moments like that. Children can relate to the idea of leaving something behind, whether it's a favorite toy or a familiar place, and learn about the value of embracing new beginnings.



SACRED STORY ENGAGEMENT

This resource series invites particular attention to story, both within the biblical narratives and in our own faith stories (individually and as community). How do these stories come alive for us today? How is the Holy Spirit inspiring us as we encounter sacred stories? Inside you'll find prompts to engage story within a time of worship. Each idea is imagined to be about 10-15 minutes in length and highly adjustable for your leadership and context. These ideas are rooted in the understanding that we can all share our faith stories. Who might be invited into this sharing within your community?

We've divided this resource into three sections: Dwell, Look, Connect.

- The Dwell section gives you prompts to explore the scripture stories in a deeper and curious way.
- The Look section invites you to consider faith stories through imagery in both ancient and current contexts.
- The Connect section draws out more creative and embodied engagement; allowing space for communities to interact and play within our sacred stories.

Within each section we have provided variations on the theme to scale the level of community involvement:

- One: Just the leader is involved with the story sharing. The community is invited to listen and ponder.
- Two: The leader engages the community with questions and invitations. No supplies are needed.
- Three: The leader facilitates space for community interaction. Some basic supplies are needed.

We know that worship styles, spaces, and those who gather are different for each faith community. We hope that you experience these offerings as simply ideas to encourage meaningful connection with sacred stories within the biblical text and within your community. If you are using this resource as a weekly series, consider selecting one idea for the entire series as a way to have a consistent rhythm in your story sharing practice -or- experiment with a different story sharing practice each week to help expand the imagination of the worshiping community -or- some combination that connects with your community context.

May you be inspired to dwell, look, and connect in new ways as our faith narratives come alive!
